Different cultures unveil different perceptions of light.

George **Yakoulov** (Yakoulian)

I love the primordial force, the passion for struggle, the searching qualities and the mature tenderness of the art of our Armenian people, who first unify sadness with beauty and thereby grasp the full reality of life.

Arshile GORKY (Vosdanig Adoyan)

Armenia, this tiny piece of earth subjected to horrible calamities, profaned a thousand times yet ever sanctified by blood and faith... All my life I have striven to depict on canvas this small piece of land.

In one of the smallest republics of the Soviet Union and one of the oldest cradles of civilization, contemporary Armenian painting attains significant results.

The aim of this exhibition is to present 120 works by twelve artists of the new movement, which emerged in Armenia during the nineteen-sixties and gained amplitude in the seventies. These works presented for the first time in Paris and New York, were executed during the last decade in Yerevan, the capital of Armenia.

The selection was made with the help of the artists in an attempt to assemble their most characteristic works. However, this exhibit does not claim to cover all the avant-garde artists of Armenia, whose works, had they been incorporated, would hardly have shown any dissonance in quality.

Taken as a whole, these paintings coming from the Soviet Union seem to go beyond socialist realism in the strictest sense of the term, but they do not represent a refusal or an opposition. Contemporary Armenian art has developed naturally from a two thousand-year-old tradition. The artists remain spiritually linked to their ancient culture, primarily that of murals, medieval miniature painting (illuminated manuscripts), khachkars (carved stone crosses) and Armenian carpets. In recent years the influences of Yakoulov, Gorky and Sarian have accentuated this evolution. The eternal source of inspiration for all Armenian art, however, remains in the local colors: the sun; the multicolored tufa stones of pink, red, ochre... the blue sky, cloudless for more than three hundred days a year — set against the white majestic background of Mount Ararat.

In Soviet Arménia all artistic manifestation take place in broad daylight; there are no exhibitions in private apartments. The artists presented in this exhibit are members of the Union of Artists of Armenia which counts more than five hundred members for a population of three million. There is strong support by the local population and the number of collectors is increasing. The covers of literary magazines regularly print works by these artists.

This could well explain why Armenia was the first country in the world to establish a Children's Art Museum-Gallery and the only country in the Soviet Union that has a Museum of Modern Art.

Born in 1937 in Yerevan. Self-taught.

Received third prize at the Vienna International Art Competition (1959) and first prize at the Komitas Centennial Art Competition in Yerevan (1969).

Has participated in group exhibitions in Sofia, Berlin, Prague, Paris, Yerevan and Moscow.
